View from the Chair Rosemary Wake

It seems a strangely quiet year compared with last, perhaps due to all that snow and waiting for spring, or perhaps summer... For the Committee it was less busy since the proposals for amendment to the constitution and for setting the Association on a more secure financial footing, all of which had been time-consuming, were passed by the membership at the 2010 AGM. Following the business meeting we enjoyed a fascinating session on how geology has shaped our city, with especial reference, of course, to our local volcano. We are most grateful to Angus Miller of Geowalks for accepting our invitation and for struggling through the snows to reach us. And to the Minto Hotel for providing the venue.

Nor has it been a particularly busy year for planning applications, monitoring which is one of the most important activities of the committee. Road works have continued to be a matter of concern, and we have continued to press for the upgrading of the road surface of South Gray Street. From the spring we were aware that some streets in the area, including Minto Street, were to be dug up to allow upgrading of gas mains. This did not happen as initially scheduled. It was disappointing that alerts regarding parking only appeared after work had started and following enquiry from members of the Committee but clear-up work on the first phase, including relaying the cobbles in Middleby Street, has gone well. Disruption will continue for some time, however, as there are many weeks of work still ahead.

The variety of events held in the past year is described elsewhere in the newsletter and I would like, on behalf of the membership to thank again those individuals involved in organising them. Social get-togethers, visits, walks, the glut group, the history group – a varied menu. It is also reassuring to see that the Neighbourhood Watch, which in the WBA works through an email alert system seems to be coming to life again.

Our second summer walks programme started in May with two evening wanders following the excellent 'Southside Heritage Walk' leaflet produced by the Southside Heritage Group (available from the South Side Community Centre in Nicolson Street). We extended our second walk into Greyfriars Churchyard and found the resting places of many famous Edinburgh citizens.

We continued with nearby walks to Blackford Pond and the Hermitage of Braid, Holyrood Park and Duddingston and the Innocent Railway. A 'History Walk' then took us out through Sciennes and Marchmont and back by Bruntsfield Links and the Meadows where we saw some evidence of the International Exhibition of 1886.

Our final walk was on a Sunday afternoon when we took the bus to Little France. Our walk took us into Craigmillar Castle Park, past the Castle, down Lady Susan's Walk and then to the Bridgend Allotments. We were

very lucky to spot a bullfinch and to come across a fine patch of orchids. Also, to our delight, the allotment holders were having an open day and we were able to 'stock up' with their produce. We crossed Dalkeith Road and explored Inch House and grounds before returning home by Craigmillar Park.

We managed some impromptu socialising on some of our walks with a stop off at the Sheep Heid Inn and a glass of wine in a quiet garden.

West Blacket History Rosemary Wake

WBA members with an interest in local history had various ways of indulging it this year: a meeting, a visit and the 'history walks'.

The best-known green sites in south Edinburgh are the Meadows and Holyrood Park but there are others less obvious. In April, Peter McGowan talked to the group about surveys of historic landscapes, illustrated by three he had carried out for the City of Edinburgh. Newington Cemetery, on the west side of Dalkeith Road, opened in 1846, its layout comprising walks, trees, terraces and catacombs. The others, Inch Park and Pollock Halls, had their origins in domestic settings. Inch Park, today a public park with sports pitches and the council's plant nursery, started as the estate of Inch House (now used as a community centre). Edinburgh University's Pollock Halls complex developed around three 19th century Scots baronial villas - St Leonards, Salisbury Green and Abden House. All had a connection with the Nelson publishing family. The landscape combines mature trees from the old gardens and imaginative plantings producing fine displays for each season. The reports are fascinating and are available as pdf downloads on the edinburgh.gov.uk website. We are most grateful to Peter for introducing us to them.

June saw the long-heralded visit to the Royal College of Surgeons. Iain MacLaren was our guide. He gave us a very informative and lively commentary on the building and its collections, taking us to rooms not normally seen by the public. He showed us portraits and sculptures of many noted surgeons explaining their contributions to the development of medicine. We were able to wander round the museum with its many displays and Iain was on hand to answer questions and to provide anecdotes. We greatly appreciated Iain's arranging of the visit and his enthusiastic presentation.

As with the visit so with the walks – you can't beat having an enthusiastic and knowledgeable guide, indeed guides, in this case Ron and Evelynne Hill who brought together material and led us round and behind the streets and buildings of the university area and across the open spaces of the Meadows.
